Law Enforcement Operations and Statistics

Part 1 Crimes and Patrol Statistics

In 2010 we experienced a 10% increase in Part 1 Crimes, with a total of 2,210 cases in 2010, compared to 2,007 in 2009. This increase was due in large part to increases in Property Crime categories and follows three consecutive years of declining crime rates. The crime rate in 2010, 38.9 Part 1 Crimes per one thousand residents, was the second lowest rate of the past ten years.

The City's Violent Crime rate fell by 18% in 2010, compared to 2009. This significant decrease was due to a 39% decline in the number of robberies, falling from 112 in 2009 to only 68 in 2010. For the fourth consecutive year we had no Homicides. There were 13 reported Rapes, compared to 11 in 2009, and 104 Aggravated Assaults in 2010, compared to 102 in 2009.

The number of Property Crimes increased by 14% in 2010 compared to 2009, with all crime categories showing some level of increase with the exception of Residential Burglary, which fell by 7% compared to 2009. As noted in earlier reports to the City Council and in prior Quarterly Operations Reports this year, the first half of 2010 saw a significant increase in several Property Crime categories. The various strategies used by the Police Department to address these increases have been described in the Quarterly Operations Reports for this year and have resulted in much lower crime rates in the second half of 2010, at 30.1 Property Crimes per one thousand residents, compared to the first half of the year, which had a rate of 41.1.

The following table shows changes in the listed property crime types from 2009 to 2010 as well as from the first half of 2010 to the second half of the year. To provide a longer term comparison, the final column of the table shows the average number of crimes for each category for the five years spanning 2006 – 2010.

While we experienced an overall increase in crime for 2010 compared to 2009, we had significant crime decreases in three of our four Crime Focus areas. The number

of crimes at our five trolley stations dropped by 75%, due not only to the efforts of the Police Department but those of MTS as well, including added staffing when indicated and continued expansion of their electronic surveillance systems. The number of crimes in the La Mesa Village area fell by 44% and the area of Grossmont Hospital had a 31% decrease in crimes. The only Crime Focus area with an increase in crime in 2010 compared to 2009 was Grossmont Center, with an 8% increase.

During the 4th quarter of 2010, there were seven strong-arm robberies, one bank/credit union robbery, one robbery committed by a suspect with a knife, and five robberies committed by suspects armed with firearms. There was also one carjacking, from the 5400 block of Lake Murray Boulevard. Five of the cases have been closed by arrest. Following are some of the case highlights from the past quarter.

In October, two black male suspects robbed the California Coast Credit Union and fled into San Diego. One of the suspects was later involved in an officer-involved shooting with San Diego officers. Both suspects were ultimately taken into custody. La Mesa detectives assisted the FBI with the robbery investigation. Both suspects admitted to the bank robbery and detectives recovered the money, as well as additional evidence based on suspect statements.

In November, a juvenile suspect robbed the Yum Yum Donut Shop at 7550 El Cajon Boulevard. The day after the robbery, the suspect was seen in the same location and fled from approaching officers. The suspect was taken into custody a short time later.

There are three robbery cases from December where detectives are conducting follow-up on active leads. The cases involve the strong-arm robbery of a cell phone from a victim in the 8600 block of Fletcher Parkway, a robbery of an optometry office on Lake Murray Boulevard, and another strong-arm robbery of a cell phone from a victim in the 7900 block of University Avenue.

During the past quarter detectives were able to conclude several successful burglary investigations. Two subjects were arrested in connection with a residential burglary in the 8900 block of Bowling Green Drive. Some of the victim's stolen property was recovered from the residence of one of the suspects. Both suspects are awaiting trial, with one facing a potential 19 year sentence due to his criminal record.

Two other subjects were arrested for a residential burglary in the 4200 block of Woodland Drive. Subsequent investigation, including the service of two search warrants, produced evidence showing the suspects were responsible for multiple burglaries in El Cajon and the Sheriff's jurisdictions. Stolen property was recovered from both residences where the suspects lived. Investigation by allied agencies and La Mesa detectives is continuing to see if the suspects are connected to other burglaries.

A juvenile suspect was arrested following a residential burglary in the 6800 block of Colorado Avenue. Two additional subjects were contacted in the area at the time of the burglary and evidence analysis is pending to determine if these subjects were also involved in this burglary. These three subjects may also be linked to a burglary in the 5300 block of Lake Murray.

In November La Mesa detectives conducted an operation targeting subjects with property crime criminal histories who had current search & seizure waivers. Ten subjects in La Mesa were contacted. The searches resulted in one arrest for a drug possession violation but also yielded multiple electronic items in the arrestee's possession. The items were seized and research is underway to determine if the items are stolen.

Detectives continue to participate in weekly conference calls with detectives from San Diego PD, San Diego State University PD, and the Sheriff's Department. These information sharing sessions have proven extremely beneficial for investigative efforts. Detectives share pertinent information with our patrol officers and have encouraged the officers to contact detectives with information so that the information can be shared with allied agencies.

Detectives, the Investigations Intern, and RSVP Volunteers continue to use the burglary tracking system. The system has been expanded to include both vehicle and commercial burglaries. New detectives have been introduced to the tracking system and are using it to analyze trends and track potential series. This system also allows detectives to track evidence submitted to the Sheriff's Crime Lab for analysis and to follow-up on any return from the lab. The Investigations Intern continues to monitor Craig's List for activity regarding property stolen during La Mesa burglary cases.

The Police Department's K-9 team deployed 17 times during the 4th Quarter of the year. The deployments involved searches of vehicles or private residences, with 12 taking place in La Mesa and 5 in other jurisdictions, at the request of the local law enforcement agency. There were 8 "alerts" by the K-9 during these activities, resulting in the seizure of the following drugs as well as 5 felony arrests and 3 misdemeanor arrests for drug related charges.

- Methamphetamine – 24.3 grams
- Marijuana – 540.2 grams

The K-9 Team gives public demonstrations to talk about the program and to show how the K-9 alerts to drugs. Two demonstrations were given during the past quarter, one at the Carancho Street Block Party and the second for the La Mesa – Spring Valley School District at Murdock Elementary in Casa de Oro.

In October one of the Department's Patrol Squads conducted a three day special enforcement detail, focusing on activities in and around the trolley stations as well as several areas prone to vehicle burglaries and/or transient encampments. Over the course of the operation the officers used a variety of tactics in both uniformed and plain-clothes activities. As part of their work they conducted searches of sixty different subjects who had search and seizure waivers as part of their conditions of parole or probation. During the three days the officers made three felony arrests and four misdemeanor arrests on charges including parole violations, illegal weapons, and possession of marijuana.

The Patrol Division statistics are included in your report and show an increase in calls-for-service of 7% compared to 2009, along with a net decline in hours worked of 10%, reflecting the number of actual and operational vacancies in the Division during 2010. In spite of these impacts, officer initiated activities increased by 5%.

Gang Issues and Enforcement

During the 4th quarter the East County Gang Task Force Detective participated in thirteen details with the Task Force. These details involved drug sales investigations, surveillance operations aimed at gang members, and probation/parole searches. These details took place in La Mesa, Spring Valley, Lemon Grove, Chula Vista, National City, Imperial Beach, Santee, and Lakeside.

Our Gang Task Force detective continues to assist La Mesa detectives in gang-related investigations in our City. During this quarter the Gang Task Force detective assisted in the successful investigation of the carjack robbery from Lake Murray Boulevard.

Based on CAL-Gangs records, there are 127 documented gang members living in La Mesa as of the end of the 4th Quarter. This number can fluctuate due to the transient nature of some gang members and has averaged 123 over the course of 2010.

Special Enforcement Detail

SED was involved in several enforcement sweeps during the 4th Quarter of 2010, including assisting the East County Gang Task Force with a warrant sweep operation. SED also participated as plain clothes and uniformed officers at Grossmont Center during the holiday shopping season and assisted La Mesa detectives in operations.

This quarter SED personnel responded to eight call-out requests. Two requests came from Patrol officers, with one call-out resulting in the seizure of over three kilos of Cocaine. SED assisted La Mesa detectives on six call-outs, related to burglary investigations, a carjacking, search warrant operations, and the missing person/possible abduction case from Grossmont Center, which proved to be unfounded.

Major case work by SED personnel this quarter included the following:

- Assisted Regional Auto Theft Task Force detectives with an auto business inspection at 8090 University Avenue
- Assisted State Parole with the arrest of wanted fugitive
- Assisted in an FBI-led gang member arrest operation, “Operation Eclipse”
- Participated in the Regional Auto Theft Task Force “Operation Gang Busters” arrest operation

Narcotics Task Force

Our Narcotics Task Force detective, assigned to NTF Team 2, worked with team members on several significant investigations this quarter. The Team conducted a search on three probationers at a house in Allied Gardens in October 2010. The search resulted in the seizure of methamphetamine and psilocybin mushrooms. All three residents were arrested on charges of possession of controlled substances for sales and for being under the influence of a controlled substance.

NTF Team 2 initiated an investigation into a suspected methamphetamine dealer in El Cajon. After an undercover agent successfully purchased ½ ounce of methamphetamine from the suspect and an arrest was made.

The 2010 outdoor marijuana eradication season ended in December 2010. The DCESP (Domestic Cannabis Eradication and Suppression Program) efforts have successfully eradicated over 300,000 plants from the County rural areas. The NTF Detective participated in several of these operations.

Registered Sex Offenders

During the 4th quarter, the total number of registered sex offenders in the City of La Mesa was 67, compared to 66 at the end of the 3rd Quarter. All subjects were in compliance with their registration requirements.

Domestic Violence

Attached to your report is a summary of reported Domestic Violence cases for the past three years, 2008 – 2010. After two consecutive years of increases, the number of cases declined 6% in 2010 compared to 2009.

Parolees and Probationers

Attached to your report are three charts showing the parolee population in La Mesa at the end of 2010 and the primary offense for which they were committed to prison. 126 parolees are identified as living in La Mesa at the end of 2010, compared 129 at the end of 2009.

Two charts are included in this quarter's report on the number of adults living in La Mesa who are on probation and a summary of the offenses for which probation was granted.

DUI Prevention and Enforcement

The following tables provide information on annual DUI arrest and collision data, as well as DUI operations during the past quarter.

This quarter Traffic Unit personnel conducted six DUI enforcement operations in La Mesa, including one held jointly with the Sheriff's Department, and participated in a joint operation with the San Diego State University Police Department. These operations are all funded through one of three grants from the California Office of

Traffic Safety, the “DUI Enforcement and Awareness Grant”, the “DUI Mini Grant”, or the “Avoid the DUI” grant.

Traffic Collisions / Citations / Enforcement Operations

During the 4th Quarter only one location in the City had multiple traffic collisions, the intersection of Baltimore Drive and El Cajon Boulevard, with two collisions. One was caused by a violation of signs/signals, resulting in one person sustaining a complaint of pain injury, and the second caused by a right of way violation, resulting in a minor injury. Over the course of 2010 no location in the City was found to have multiple collisions in more than one quarter of the year.

Our most recent grant period for “Click It or Ticket”, the seatbelt awareness and enforcement program, began in mid November. One enforcement operation was conducted in November and resulted in 63 citations being issued. In December Traffic Unit officers worked with students at Helix High to conduct a mock seatbelt checkpoint operation. Students who were wearing their seatbelts received coupons

for pizza while those not wearing seatbelts were given a “warning” ticket. Officers found 85% of the students were in compliance with seatbelt requirements.

During the 4th Quarter of the year the Traffic Unit received 5 traffic complaint/enforcement requests. The top three complaint locations were:

Yale Avenue & Murray Hill Drive: Stop Sign violations

The Traffic Unit dedicated extra enforcement activity to the area on ten occasions and issued 28 citations.

8900 Jefferson: Speed violations

The Traffic Unit provided extra enforcement in this area but found no violations. The average speed of traffic was found to be approximately 20 MPH.

Harbinson Avenue: Speed violations

The Traffic Unit dedicated extra enforcement activity to the area but found no violations.

Community Resource Unit Activities and Information

School Resource Officers

Officer Hildebrand – Helix Charter High School SRO: Officer Hildebrand is temporarily assigned as the SRO while Officer McNamara is on maternity leave.

During the 4th quarter Officer Hildebrand attended four SARB conferences, two SRO meetings, and conducted one TASER demonstration.

He investigated four petty theft cases, one grand theft case, two minor injury collisions, one Child Protective Services referral, one statutory rape investigation, and conducted one truancy check. During the quarter he also arrested three juveniles for truancy and one subject for delaying an officer in his official duties.

Officer McDaniel – La Mesa – Spring Valley School District SRO: Officer McDaniel gave a presentation to students and parents regarding “Bullying” at La Mesa Dale Elementary. She also gave two presentations regarding prescription drugs at Vista La Mesa Academy for Red Ribbon Week. At Parkway Middle School, Officer McDaniel gave a presentation regarding Law Enforcement as a career.

Officer McDaniel participated in a student intervention at Parkway Middle school, which involved the student, family, school officials, and the school Probation Officer. She also attended a Parkway Middle School truancy hearing. Officer McDaniel has conducted five home visits regarding truant students.

Officer McDaniel attended and participated in the Police Department’s Neighborhood Forum at Northmont Elementary School and participated in the “National Walk to School” event. She attended several school district meetings for School Resource Officers.

Officer McDaniel addressed parking and traffic safety issues at several of the schools and had several areas painted as “No Parking/Fire Lane.” She has also been working with Safety Patrol students during drop-off and pick-up hours at each of the schools.

Crime Prevention Specialists

CPS Gleason: CPS Gleason continued to work on the volunteer graffiti abatement program known as the “Paint Out Posse”. The “Paint Out Posse” currently has eight citizens who contribute regularly to the effort by looking for and reporting graffiti to

the Graffiti Hot Line. Their efforts are complimented by volunteers who, along with CPS Gleason, respond to the graffiti sightings and remove or cover the vandals' markings. There are now six members who help with painting out the tags as they are found. Three new volunteers will be joining the Posse in January of 2011. CPS Gleason is assisting with the implementation of the new "Graffiti Tracker" Program.

CPS Jones: During the 4th quarter, newly hired Crime Prevention Specialist Erin Jones was fully trained in her crime prevention duties. She conducted two Neighborhood Watch Meetings along with seven community presentations. These included personal safety presentations for the Springs Senior Apartments and the Center for Young Imaginations, representing the Department at Oktoberfest, and conducting four tours of the new station. CPS Jones also coordinated the annual "Police Station Visitor's Week" event.

The majority of her time during the fourth quarter was spent on crime prevention training with Crime Analyst Heather Sara. In addition, she completed the Crime Free Multi-Housing Manager, San Diego County Crime Free Ordinance, and Counterfeit and Pirated Merchandise Trainings.

Other Community Activities

In 2007 the Police Department participated in the "Police Station Visitors Week" program for the first time. This is an international program sponsored by the Vera Institute. Community groups are invited to visit their local police stations, learn about law enforcement operations and practices, and assess the police agency's performance.

We were invited to participate in the program again in 2010. Our event took place in the last week of October and as noted, was coordinated by CPS Erin Jones. The results of our assessment should be available sometime this coming spring.

In November the Department held the second of our series of Neighborhood Forums, with this event taking place at Northmont Elementary School. The general format of the forums has been to provide brief presentations from Police Department

staff covering the role and duties of the School Resource Officer, our procedures in monitoring sex offenders, promoting Neighborhood Watch and the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) Programs, and providing an overview of recent crime trends in the area. The vast majority of the time at each forum is dedicated to addressing questions and concerns from those in attendance.

Domestic Violence Statistics

Penal Code Section 13700(a) defines “Abuse”, with respect to Domestic Violence, as “Intentionally or recklessly causing or attempting to cause bodily injury, or placing another person in reasonable apprehension of imminent serious bodily injury to himself or herself, or another.”

Penal Code Section 13700(b) defines “Domestic Violence” as “Abuse committed against an adult or fully emancipated minor who is a spouse, former spouse, cohabitant, former cohabitant, or person with whom the suspect has had a child or is having or has had a dating or engagement relationship. For purposes of this subdivision, “cohabitant means two unrelated adult persons living together or a substantial period of time, resulting in some permanency of relationship. Factors that may determine whether persons are cohabiting include, but are not limited to, (1) sexual relations between the parties while sharing the same living quarters, (2) sharing of income or expenses, (3) joint use or ownership of property, (4) whether the parties hold themselves out as husband and wife, (5) the continuity of the relationship, and (6) the length of the relationship.”

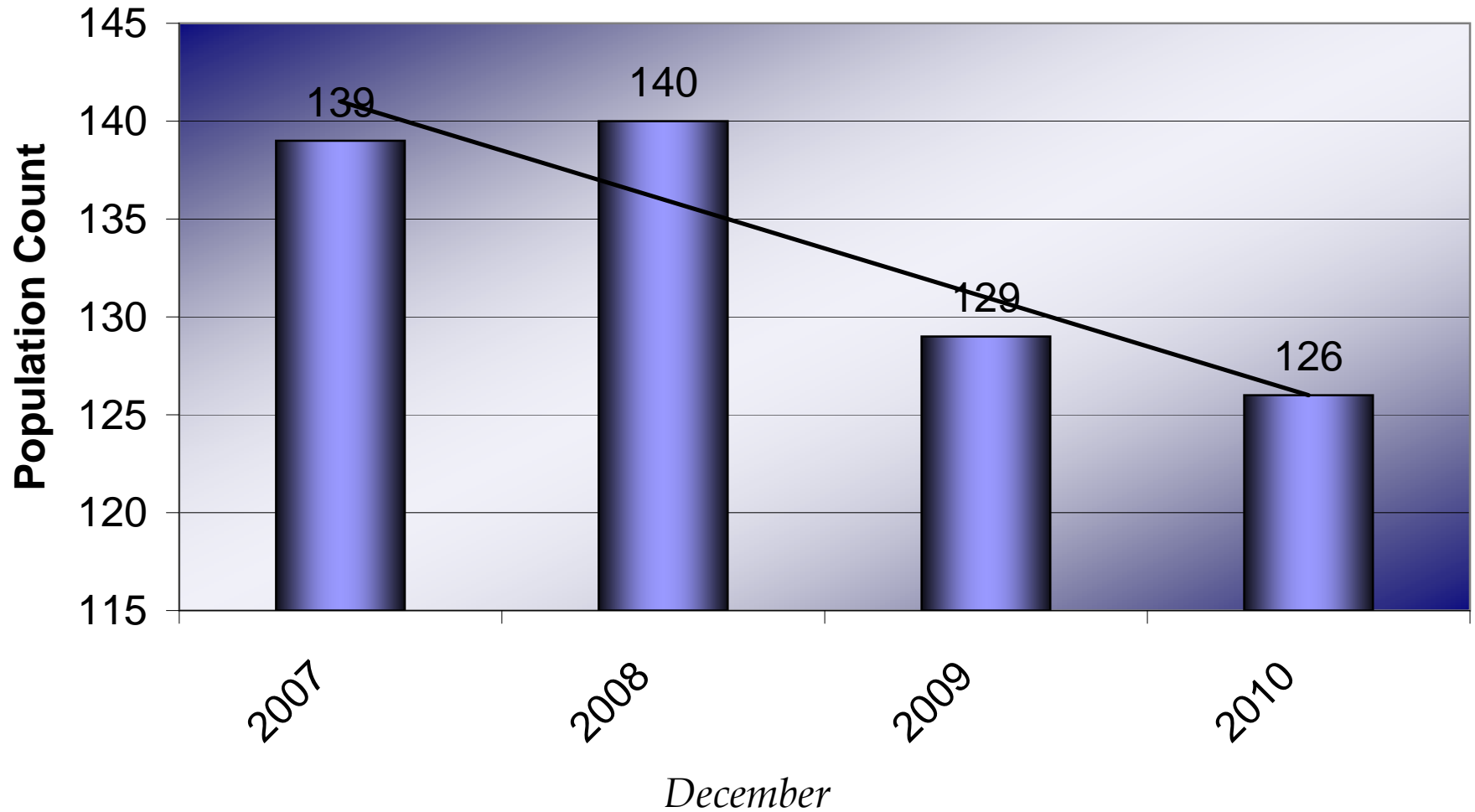

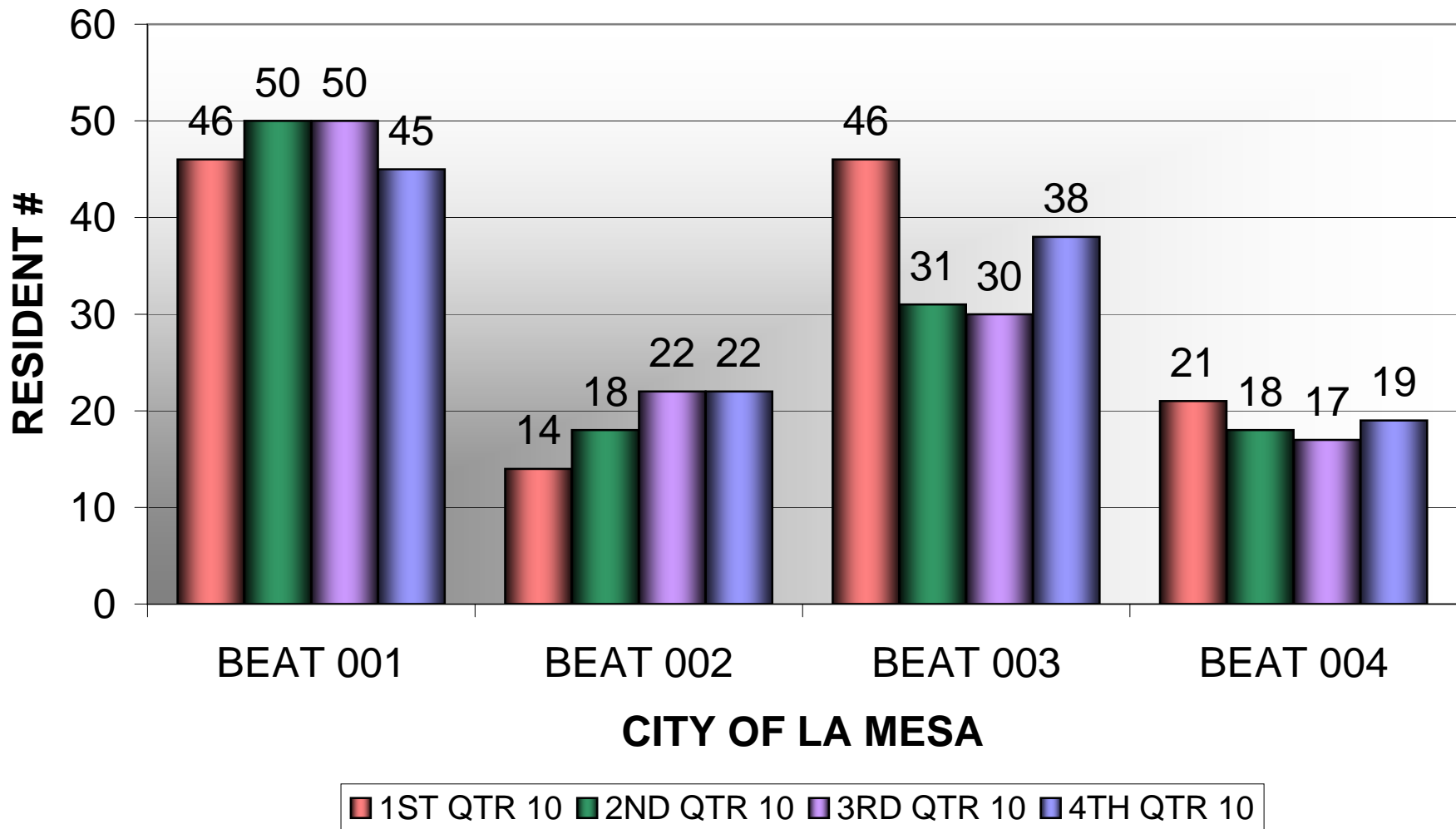
Offender Population Fluctuations

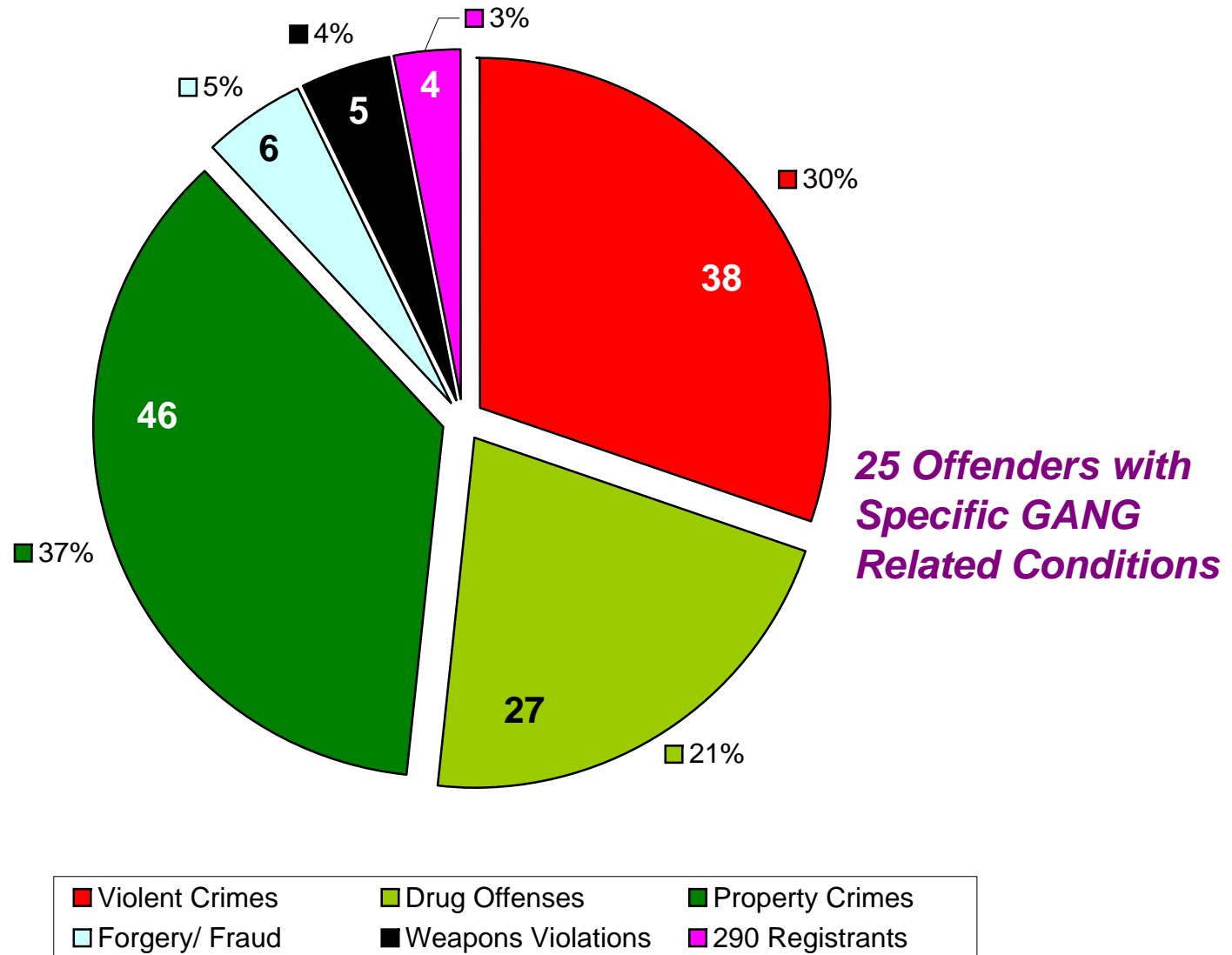
PAROLEE POPULATION CHANGES By Beat

 Offenders Living in La Mesa



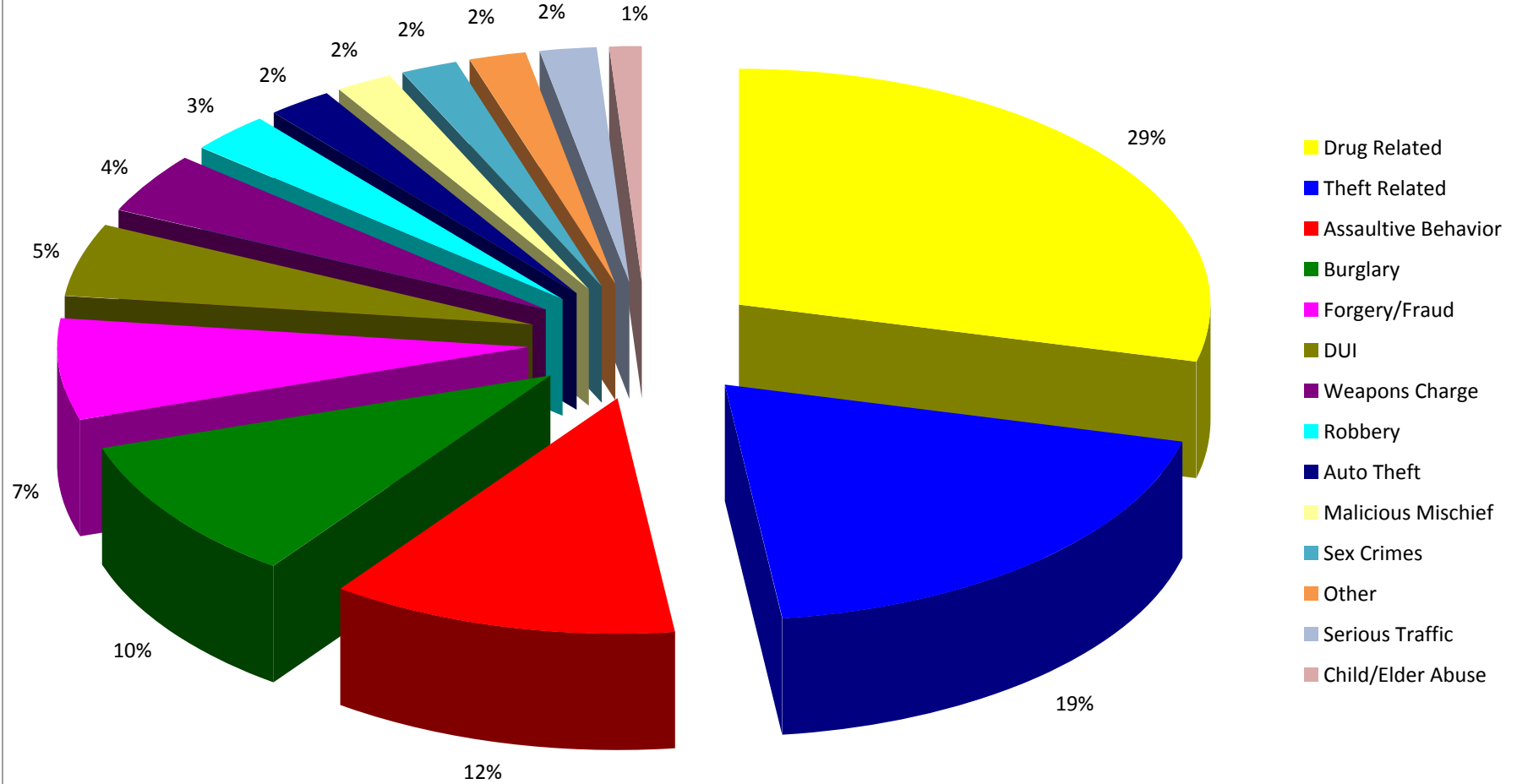

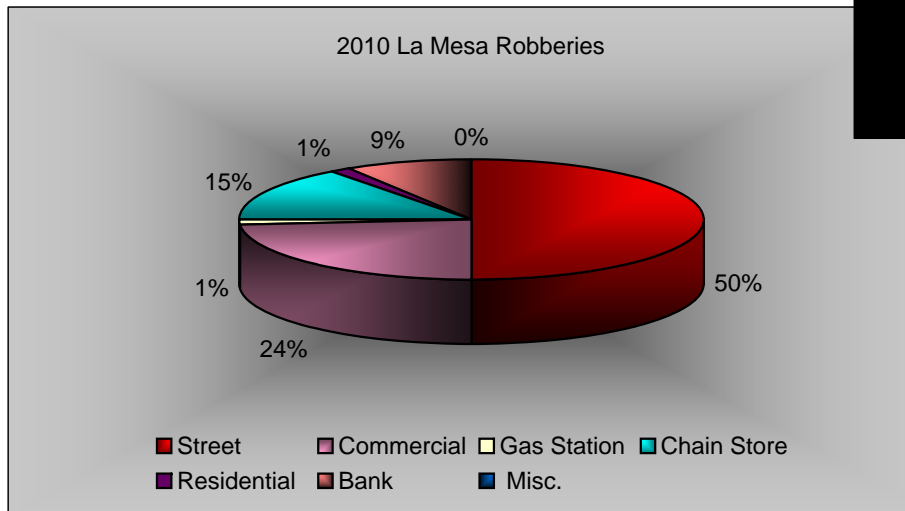
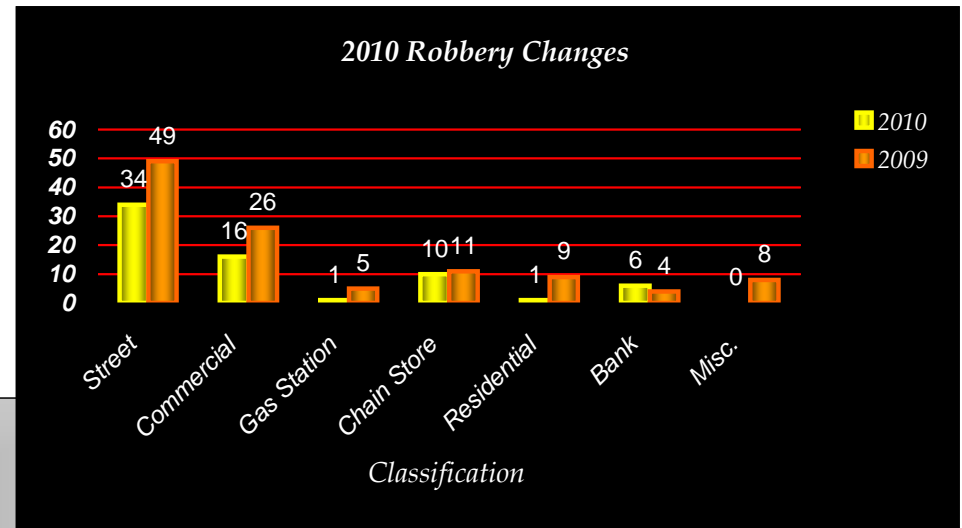
SD County Adult Probation Conviction Offenses by Type



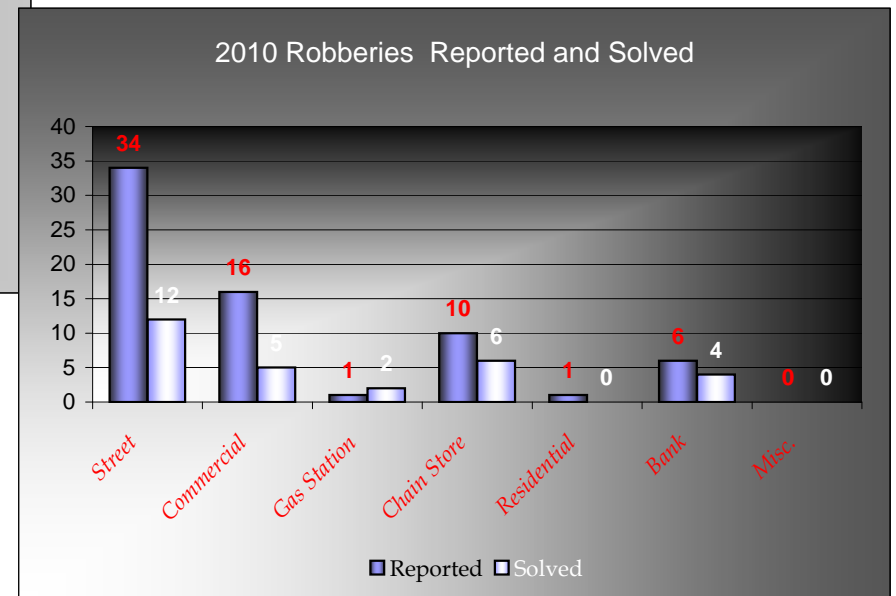

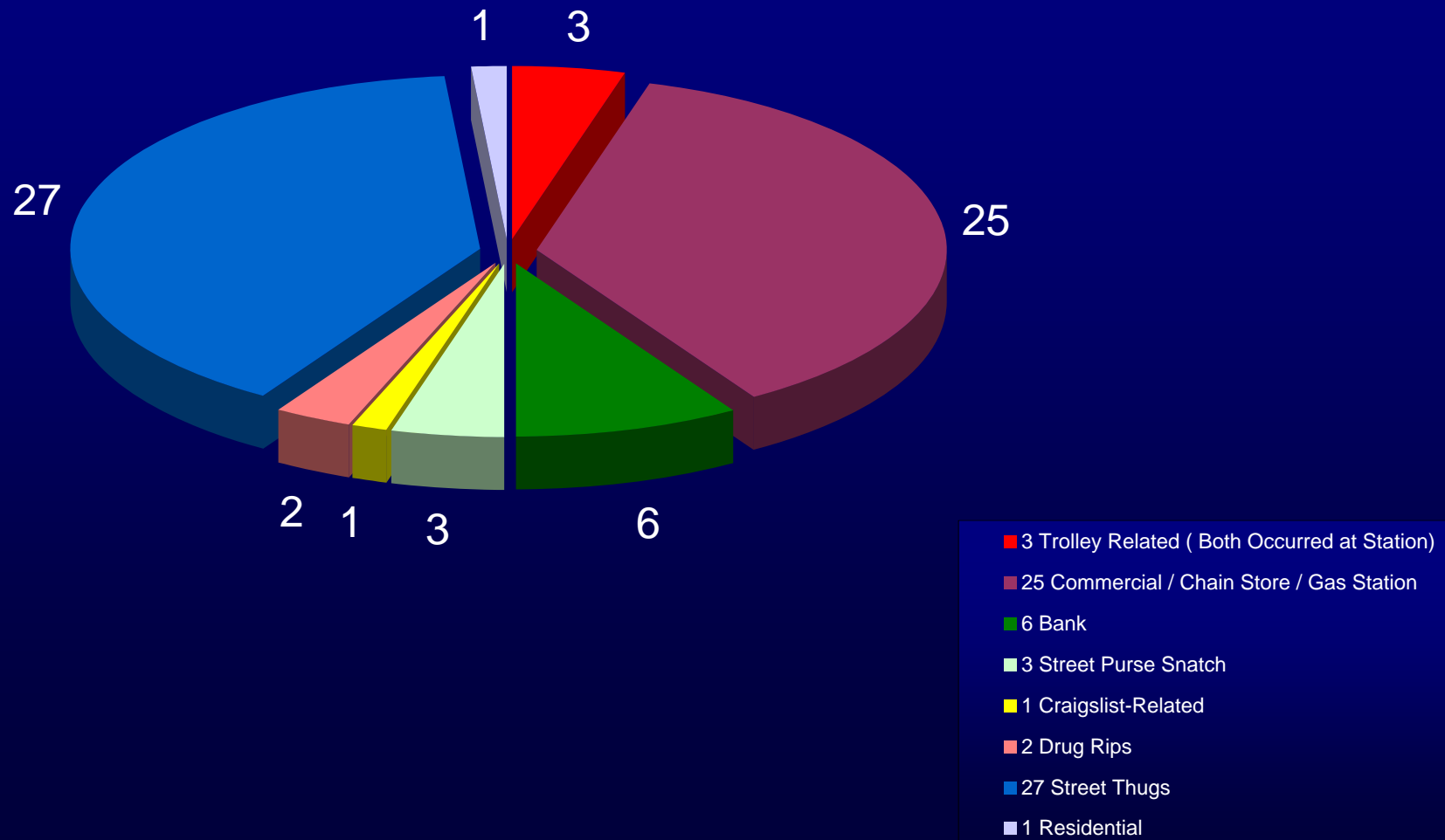

Characteristics, Types, and Relationships of Robberies



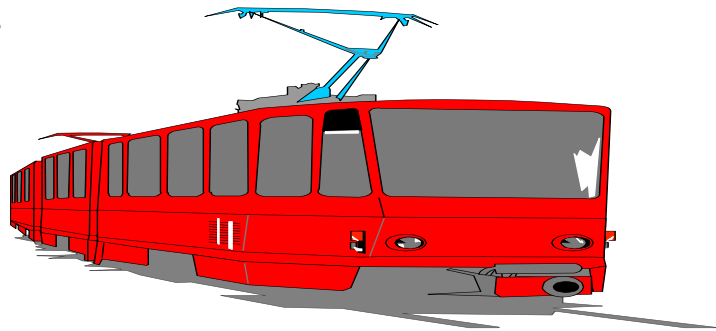

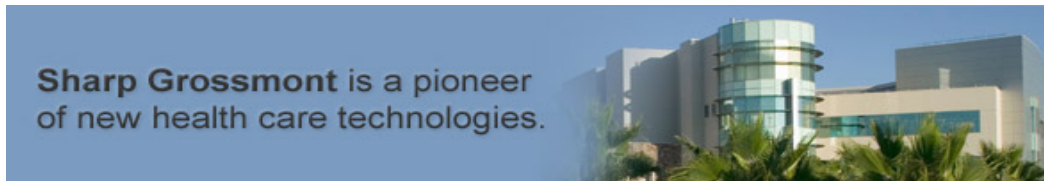
